Astudiaeth iechyd fawr yng Nghymru yn recriwtio gwirfoddolwyr

Doeth am lechyd Cymru yw'r astudiaeth ymchwil fwyaf o'i math i gael ei chynnal yng Nghymru ac mae ganddi'r potensial i drawsffurfio iechyd a lles y genedl.

Mae Doeth am lechyd Cymru yn gobeithio recriwtio 260,000 o wirfoddolwyr, 16 mlwydd oed a throsodd, i gymryd rhan yn yr astudiaeth. Bydd gofyn i wirfoddolwyr ateb cyfres o gwestiynau i helpu ymchwilwyr ddeall iechyd pobl yng Nghymru yn well. Bydd y wybodaeth a gesglir o'r prosiect hefyd yn cael ei defnyddio fel sail i gynllunio'r dyfodol yn y GIG.

£1 miliwn o gyllid i bobl ifanc sydd wedi profi gofal

Bydd Cronfa Dydd Dewi Sant, a gyhoeddwyd gan Ysgrifennydd y Cabinet ar gyfer Cymunedau a Phlant, Carl Sargeant AC, yn rhoi £1 miliwn o gyllid ychwanegol i awdurdodau lleol er mwyn helpu pobl ifanc sydd wedi profi gofal.

Bydd yr arian ar gael i bobl ifanc rhwng 16 a 25 mlwydd oed, sydd wedi gadael gofal neu sydd yng ngofal awdurdod lleol, i'w cefnogi tuag at annibyniaeth. Yn 2015/16, roedd 5662 o blant mewn gofal yng Nghymru a 702 wedi gadael gofal. Nod y gronfa yw gwella canlyniadau ar gyfer y grwp hwn o bobl ifanc, gan fod eu dyfodol yn dueddol o edrych yn llai cadarnhaol na'r rhai hynny sy'n byw yng nghartref y teulu, a rhoi cyfle iddyn nhw wireddu eu potensial.

Bydd y digwyddiad yn rhoi cyfle i 50 o enethod, o wyth o ysgolion ledled Cymru, gysylltu eu personoliaeth i'r nodweddion sydd eu hangen mewn gyrfaedd STEM ac i drafod eu canlyniadau gyda merched ifainc sydd eisoes yn gweithio yn y maes.

Options for implementing the Additional Learning Needs and Education Tribunal (Wales) Bill

The Welsh Government is consulting for your views on the implementation of the Additional Learning Needs and Education Tribunal (Wales) Bill.

The Bill will create a single, unified framework for supporting learners with additional learning needs. This will replace the current range of statutory and non-statutory learning plans, which will become Individual Development Plans. It is hoped that the changes will ensure the protection of provision and rights for people with additional learning needs, regardless of the severity or complexity of these needs.

The closing date for responses is 9 June 2017.

New expert group to advise curriculum on healthy relationships

The expert panel, announced by Kirsty Williams AM, Cabinet Secretary for Education, will advise on healthy relationships as part of the current school curriculum.

The panel will offer advice and support around the delivery of healthy relationships education. With particular focus on:

- improving the understanding of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender issues
- domestic abuse and sexual violence
- respect and consent
- sexism and bullying.

Major Welsh health study recruiting for volunteers

Healthwise Wales is the largest research study of its kind to be undertaken in Wales and has the potential to transform the health and well-being of the nation.

Healthwise Wales hopes to recruit 260,000 volunteers, aged 16 and over, to take part in the study. Volunteers will be asked a series of questions to help researchers to better understand the health of people in Wales. The information gathered from the project will also be used to inform future planning within the NHS.

£1 million funding for care experienced young people

The St David's Day fund, announced by the Cabinet Secretary for Communities and Children, Carl Sargeant AM, will provide local authorities with £1 million of additional funding to help care experienced young people.

The fund will be available to young people aged 16 to 25, who are care leavers or in local authority care, to support them towards independence. In 2015/16, there were 5662 children in care in Wales and 702 care leavers. The fund aims to better the outcomes for this group of young people, whose futures tend to look less positive than those who live in the family home, and provide them with an opportunity to realise their potential.

Welsh Government join forces with academia to campaign for more girls in science and engineering

Academia and business leaders in Wales are joining forces with Welsh Government's campaign, backed by HRH The Princess Royal, to get more girls into science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) subjects in Wales.

The WISE celebration of Talented Women brings together the ministers, academics, businesses and schools backing the Welsh Government commissioned report into STEM skills shortages. Which will specifically look at how the skills shortage can be addressed by encouraging more girls and women into these areas. The event will give 50 girls, from eight schools across Wales, the opportunity to relate their personality types to the characteristics required in STEM careers and to discuss their findings with young women already working in the field.
